On Remembrance Day, Canadians pause to honour the men and women who have served and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict, and peace. More than 2,300,000 Canadians have served and more than 118,000 made the ultimate sacrifice. The poppy is the symbol of Remembrance Day. In the run-up to Remembrance Day, replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to veterans. The reason that the poppy is worn for Remembrance Day is due to a Canadian physician and poet who noticed how quickly poppies had grown over the graves of soldiers who had died during the Battle of Ypres. This symbolism of the blood-red flowers was beautifully captured by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae in his 1915 poem "In Flanders Fields." The poem was apparently discarded by McCrae but was found by soldiers who sent it to a London-based magazine named Punch. November 11th marks the signing of the armistice (peace agreement) between the Allies and Germany at Compiègne, France. The armistice took effect at eleven o'clock in the morning - the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month."

#### Development Permit

The land use bylaw requires that you obtain a development permit before starting a building project within the village. When you decide you would like to build a home, accessory building, etc, please come visit with us at the village office to determine whether you require a development permit. If you need to get an electrical, plumbing or gas permit, you will need the development permit completed first. You can expect to pay \$15 for a project for an accessory building (shed, covered deck, etc) or \$50 for a new house or moved in home. The timeline can take up to six (6) weeks, so please plan to get this permit first, to reduce any further delays for your project.

As winter is upon us, please make an effort to trim your trees and branches beside the public sidewalks. This will be a huge help for snow removal. Please be mindful of the irrigation boxes when removing snow from your sidewalks and driveways, and remind the contractor, should you hire someone to do that work for you.

#### History of the Glenwood Area

(Part 6 of 7 in a series written by Dora Law in 1967)

The first cheese was made on July 18, 1941. There were 83,199 pounds of cheese made to the end of 1941. Most of this was sold to Kraft Co in Calgary for \$.24 per pound. Milk was received from 128 farmers; this was hauled in by horse drawn vehicles and trucks. The cheese that winter in competition throughout Alberta took all the prizes with a grading of 98.5%. Farmers were paid \$1.25 per hundred for milk but the economy of the district from the "milk cheques" took a big jump. Stores reported a boost of 75% in sales due to the increased revenue.

In contrast to the above, there are now 34 producers, and 233 tons of cheese are made in 1967. Milk brings approximately \$4 per hundred and Burns pays \$.45 per pound for the cheese. A very large percent of it, however, is sold directly to customers who have learned where to go for good cheese.

Ned E. Davidson came to Glenwood from Mountain View to be the first cheese maker. Ned's father had been the cheese maker in Mountain View for 25 years and it was there that Ned got his first training and practical knowledge. He took special courses in Edmonton before coming. He made the statement when he started in Glenwood, "I'll do a good job or I won't stay." Glenwood cheese has taken more than its share of prizes over the years. It is famous far and wide for its excellent quality and a look at the many trophies and certificates won every year shows the value placed upon it. Ned's first and only helper in 1941 was Edwin Read.

The cheese factory has been added upon through the years to provide for more equipment and storage space but the original steam boiler is still operating. This was the boiler taken from a steam tractor that had been shipped from England to Raymond to break and prepare land for sugar beets way back when the Raymond Sugar Factory was first started.

A good representation of personnel from the UID have served as members of the board of directors on the cheese factory board and as helpers in the factory or milk haulers through the years. The UID Cheese Factory CoOperative Association has indeed been an asset to the district.

Mr. H.A. Kidney was made official administrator for the Municipal District in February 1935 and Official Trustee for the United Irrigation District in April 1935 in an attempt to find ways and means to make it possible for the man on the land to pay his taxes and not lose his property. Mr. Kidney was killed in a car accident in the fall of 1935 and R.B. Ritchie took over the same official jobs for five years. In 1940, Chester Asplund became official trustee of the M.D. and in 1941 was appointed colonization manager. In January 1948, Mr. John Mould replaced Mr. Asplund as official trustee and colonization manager after Mr. Asplund moved away. In November 1965, Mr. Mould died and Mr. C.J. McAndrews of Lethbridge is now official Trustee and Colonization Manager.

In the late 30's, Paul Ehlert built a skating rink on his lot in the north part of town which he later turned into an open air dance hall. This was located on the spot where Walter Olson's barn now stands.

World War II broke out August 1, 1939 and ended May 7, 1945, nearly 6 years of seeing our young men leave our town, some to never return. 69 men and 2 girls from this district spent some time in the services. Of this group, 21 saw active battlefield service. 4 were killed in enemy action: Bernard Asplund, Gus Whidden, Forest Billingsley and Mark Thomas. Joseph Law and Dwaine Lybbert were killed in training. 3 were wounded; Glen Ehlert, Gordon Loose and August Lenz. Tim Hovis was a prisoner-of-war. Daniel H. Lybbert received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Many young men, learning to fly at one of the many air bases nearby, would fly over Glenwood and show off their abilities as a stand flier. Many a cold chill was felt by the townspeople at the daring of these young men. On September 20, 1944, Joseph Law, sone of Mr. & Mrs. Richard Law, oldest of 10 children, flew low over his parents home to drop a note. His mother and brothers and sisters waved to him. He flew about two blocks, attempted to turn and crashed in the lot just west of where the Esso Bulk Station now stands. Both Joe and his co-pilot lost their lives.






