St Patrick, considered the

patron saint of Ireland, was actually born in Banna Venta Berniae, a town in Roman Britain, sometime in the late 300s AD. That's right, Patrick wasn't Irish. And his name wasn't Patrick either - it was Maewyn Succat, but he didn't care for that so he chose to be known as Patricius down the line. He actually had many monikers throughout his life: he was known by many as Magonus, by others as Succetus, and to some as Cothirthiacus. But we'll just call him Patrick since everybody else does. Has a nice ring to it...

His father, Calpurnius, was a deacon in the early Christian church, but Patrick wasn't much of a believer himself. It wasn't until he was captured by Irish pirates at the age of 16 and enslaved for six years as a shepherd that he chose to convert to Christianity. While in northeaster Ireland, Patrick learned the Irish language and culture before attempting to escape back to Britain. But Patrick wasn't very good at escaping apparently, because he was captured again. This time by the French. He was held in France where he learned all about monasticism before he was released and sent home to Britain where he continued to study Christianity well into his twenties. Eventually, Patrick claimed he had a vision that told me to bring Christianity to the Irish people, who were predominantly pagan and druidic at the time, so Patrick he made his way back to Ireland and brought bag of Christianity with him.



Gone but not Forgotten:

GEORGE WILFORD MICHEL, was born on May 2, 1945 in Zurich, Switzerland. He passed away on February 13, 2021 in his home with his wife and children. his wife and children, they gutted the house and put it back together and it now looks even better inside. Then he turned to building cedar chests and other chests for his children and was trying to build them for his grandchildren, but only was able to complete some of them. George liked learning new things. He learned to snowmobile and loved going every winter. After his mission, he took flying lessons and purchased a Cessna 172. He really loved to fly and made many local flights and even flew to Banff. Unfortunately, the upkeep on the plane was too much and he had to sell it. Later, he bought a boat and learned to waterski. He taught his children and some of his grandchildren to waterski as well. He also learned to scuba dive and enjoyed a diving trip to the Bahamas. George served in many positions in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He was a Venturer leader, a teacher, and a Branch President. George and Patricia also served a Home Storage mission in Lethbridge for 18 months. Municipal Viability Reviews

What is a viability review?

A viability review is a process that helps municipalities determine their ability to continue as a municipality or develop a plan that leads to viability. The process brings decision makers together and employers communities to make decisions about their future through collaboration and cooperation. https://www.alberta.ca/viability-reviews-for-municipalities.aspx

The review analyzes the municipality's:

- 1. Governance
- 2. Finances
- 3. Infrastructure
- 4. Services

Review Process:

- 1. Begin a review
- 2. Ministry screening
- 3. Information collection
- 4. Recommendations and options
- 5. Public vote (if required)

What happens after the review is completed?

After such reviews, aside from the very lengthy report, there is communication from the Minister of Municipal Affairs with certain mandated directives, suggestions and goals to achieve over a 5-year period of time.

Let's point out some possible misconceptions about municipal viability reviews:

- A viability review done with a municipality always results in dissolution of that municipality. "If, after reviewing the comments of residents and councils, the minister decides a vote will be held, it is administered by Municipal Affairs staff in accordance with the Local Authorities Election Act."
 - A viability review costs a huge amount of money for the municipality.

"The cost of a review varies depending on the complexity and time it takes to complete. Costs are distributed between Municipal Affairs, municipalities and municipal associations.

Municipal Affairs: ministry staff time and materials for researching, writing, printing & distributing information and reports; the cost of public meetings and community engagement activities; a municipal grant to pay for the infrastructure audit

Municipalities: costs of municipal staff to compile information; travel costs to meetings; costs of additional council meetings; remuneration for councillors to attend review meetings

Municipal Associations: travel costs to meetings and remuneration for association representatives to attend review meetings"

The Village of Hill Spring completed their viability review in the summer of 2017. They did have a dissolution vote as part of the process. The results of the vote were 57 votes to remain an independent municipality and 43 votes to dissolve the village.




