Most charities prefer to know the identify of those donors being generous to a cause. The charity has a desire to THANK the donor. Angel Gifts, by people that prefer not to be known, do not want to draw attention to themselves; the sincere support is not done conditionally with an expectation of thanks or recognition. They possibly want to support many situations and causes and wish not to disrupt their professional & personal relationships in the public eye. It is a low percentage of people who gift anonymously. We encourage you to try it! There is a special type of joy in knowing you've made a difference, and no one gets to run after you to say thank you. It's your private place and highly gratifying. If new to the idea . . . try this . . . say you're in a restaurant and see a table with someone you don't know - say, Mom/Dad & little ones having dinner and, for whatever the reason, there are few smiles and laughter coming from that family or group. Making the Right Call

When it comes to reporting a crime there can sometimes be confusion on the best way to reach out to police, in particular in non emergency based situations. Though everyone is familiar with 9-1-1, there are other police reporting lines that the general public may not be as aware of such as your local detachment non-emergency line, local detachments administrative line, and online crime reporting.

For any emergency situation or crime in progress the best number to call is 9-1-1. These calls are answered by the Operational Communications Centre (OCC) and once answered a general duty officer is then dispatched. Calls to 9-1-1 can include anything from a life threatening incident and crime in progress to the witnessing of an intoxicated driver. Calls to 9-1-1 are considered high priority calls that will always be answered before non-emergency calls, and may require immediate police attention due to the seriousness and severity of the incident.

For non emergency crimes please call the non-emergency number found in your local municipality. Examples of when to call the non emergency line include, but are not limited to the following; suspicious vehicles, activities or persons, neighbourhood disputes, noise issue, break and enters and thefts where the suspect is not there and crimes committed in the past.

Your Detachments Administrative line is to be called when you are following up on an incident that has already been reported and you are calling to speak to the investigative officer assigned to your file; or you are calling to speak to a specific officer in the Detachment. It is important to note that this phone number is NOT monitored outside of the detachments designated office hours, nor is this number to be used to report crimes in progress or emergencies.

An online crime report can be made through the Alberta RCMP at <u>ocre-sielc.rcmp-grc.gc.ca</u>. The easy-to-use website guides you through a series of questions that gives police pertinent information about the incident and can be completed in as little as 15 minutes.

Online reports can be made for matters such as damage/mischief to property under \$5000, theft of bicycle under \$5000, theft under \$5000, theft under \$5000, and lost property. Reportable online reporting incidents can not be reported if there are witnesses or suspects, the items lost or stolen are over \$5000, the vandalized property will cost over \$5000 to repair, or if any items lost or stolen involve personal identity (ie: passports, driver licenses, birth certificates, etc..), firearms, or license plates.

All online reports are reviewed by the RCMP and are prioritized to the Call Back Unit, a specialized team that handles all non-emergency calls. Since 2020 this unit has been responsible for responding to more than 2500 non emergency calls throughout the province. All crimes reported online will be followed up with a phone call from a police officer in "K" Division's Call Back Unit (CBU) within five business days.

To provide anonymous tips on crimes that have already been committed like property crime and narcotics, individuals can contact Crime Stoppers at 1 800 222 8477 (TIPS) or online at www.P3Tips.com or by using the P3Tips app available trough the Apple App or Google Play Store.

Reporting all crimes and suspicious activities to police is extremely important. All calls are logged and the intelligence from these reported incidents are used to ensure police are being deployed effectively to those areas that are being most impacted by crime. The intelligence collected is also used to analyze current crime trends and predict future ones. Even if you are unsure if a crime has been committed, it is always best to make sure to report the incident and allow police to conduct a further investigation.

Although Facebook, Instagram and Twitter are common platforms today to relay information, be aware that reporting suspicious activity or any crime on social media platforms does not mean the police know about it. In order to ensure suspicious activity and crimes are accurately reported to the police, please ensure that you report the incident to the police directly. RCMP members do not monitor social media accounts. Chances are good that if you have not reported it to the police, the police do not know about it.

Burning Basics

While burning may be the simplest way to clean up a site, you may be breaking the law.

Open burning, in a barrel or not, can release pollutants, reduce visibility, create unpleasant odors and cause toxic contamination.

With this in mind, burning can still be an effective way to clean some of the debris from your yard, farm or work site. However, you should keep in mind that under the *Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act*, burning certain materials is illegal.

What You Can Burn

Burnable debris includes:

- Brush and fallen trees
- Used power and telephone poles that do not contain preservatives
- Wood or wood products not containing preservatives
- Solid waste from tree harvesting
- Straw, stubble, grass, weeds, leaves and tree prunings
- Solid waste from post and pole operations that does not contain wood preservatives

What You Can't Burn

Prohibited debris includes:

- Animal manure
 - Pathological waste (waste from human health centres)
 - Wood or wood products containing wood preservatives
 - Waste materials from construction sites
 - · Rubber, including tires
 - Plastic, including baler twine
 - Oi
 - Containers that held pesticides, or any other chemicals
 - Plastic or rubber-coated materials, including copper wire

Remember to Recycle

- Many items that you may consider burning, can be recycled
- Plastic, paper, cardboard and metal materials, used oil, tires and beverage containers along with many other items are recycled in Alberta. Call the Recycle Info Line at 1-800-463-8320 for local information
- It's often more effective to chip and compost yard waste. Composting reduces household waste by up to 30 per cent.

When do you need a permit to burn? A permit is needed to burn:

- · Prohibited debris anywhere in Alberta
- Burnable debris in restricted areas
- Contact your local fire department to learn more about restrictions and requirements
- Fire season starts March 1 in Alberta and runs to at least October 31, though it can be extended. During the fire season all burning activities in Alberta's Forest Protection Area, excluding campfires, will require a fire permit. Fire permits are free and can be obtained by contacting your local Alberta Environment and Parks office. Phone tollfree 310-0000 to locate your nearest office or call the department's Information Centre for assistance.

Where You Can't Burn

Prohibited areas include:

- Unauthorized burning is prohibited in all landfills
- Burning is restricted in Calgary, Edmonton and many other rural and urban municipalities
- Burning in the Forest Protection Area requires a permit. To examine a map of the forest protection area and its constituent fire control zones go to this webpage:

- During fire season, it's possible fire bans will be in place during times of increasing fire hazard. To find out where current fire bans are located, go to this webpage:

Be Sure

Different laws regulate where you may burn, and some require you have a permit even for burnable debris. Always contact your local municipality prior to striking a match.

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


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
